Topic: ARPA funds review - Center Street redesign project, fire department, city hall, downtown wifi.

Meeting called to order at 5:30pm.

The meeting opened with a review of the \$500,000 funding request for a center street redesign and scoping study. It was explained that the money requested would be used to leverage additional funding for this project. It was noted that we are likely 4 years away from initiating the project. Alderwoman Davis inquired what \$500,000 would buy the city. Brennan explained that the money would be used predominately for grant matches. Additionally it was noted that there many potential projects could emerge from as a result of the center street redesign throughout the downtown.

Chief Lovett presented the fire departments ARPA request for self-contained breathing Apparatuses, or air packs. Please see the attached for the document outlining the fire departments presented ARPA request. Alderwoman Davis inquired if it is possible to cut the request in half and to utilize the existing fire equipment fund. Chief Lovett shared his concern with utilizing the equipment replacement fund and its potential impact on future needs. Treasurer Markowski asked if there was room in the operational budget to offset a portion of the cost. Alderman Ettori echoed the thought of Alderwoman Davis, stating that he supports a portion of the funding coming from the fire equipment replacement fund and not just solely from ARPA money.

Mark Sadakeirski outlined items throughout City Hall in need of repair with a total ARPA request of \$52,000. The projects outlined and their corresponding costs are attached in a memorandum presented by Mark Sadakierski.

Alderman Franco provided an update regarding the request for funding downtown city wifi. Alderman Franco suggested earmarking money toward downtown wife with \$300,000 as the suggested amount to earmark toward the project. Alderwoman Davis suggested identifying what other funding sources could be available first prior to committing any ARPA funding.

The police department requests originally warned for this meeting were not presented due to a scheduling conflict.

The meeting adjourned at 6:13pm and this report is for informational purposes only.

ARPA Funds Requested for City of Rutland Fire Department 09/29/2022

SCBA(1.5)

All 32 of our current SCBA's (Self Contained Breathing Apparatuses, or Air Packs) are not part supported or compliant with standards adopted by the NFPA. They are used on every call to supply clean, fresh air to the firefighters in hazardous environments. If any of these units require repair parts or servicing, they will be taken out of service, non-repairable. Buying them over an extended period of time, a few at a time, is not allowed by the NFPA. All units must be of the same design, within a department, with the same masks, and the same bottles. Our current packs are so dated, and behind by at least two generations of models, that they will not integrate with any model currently on the market. They differ from the current standards to much that a complete change over must take place.

The estimated cost for all 32 SCBA, was \$224,800 on January 12, 2022. As of this morning, the estimate is \$257,280. An increase of \$32,480. We will seek bids.

The reality of the effects of COVID on the supply chain are known by all. We see it every day. The lack of everything from chips to heat resistant webbing, leaves us all at a disadvantage. The taxpayers are at the disadvantage.

How we pay for these air packs is a great concern. If we put the money into the budget, it immediately effects the tax rate. If we take the funds out of the Fire Equipment Fund, we won't have those funds available to offset the rising costs of apparatus, and have to hit the tax payers, during an election, when we need apparatus. I don't support this option.

The ARPA money, considered by some as a gift, may be just that, for us. By seeking bids and buying these air packs, we get them on order, before the end of year 10% increase, and the new rules that ban the use of our current ones. By ordering them essentially, today, we lock in this pricing, and although we won't see them for 4-6 months, we will eventually get them. If we wait, we may or may not be able to get them before the end life of those being used today.

Estimates/ Quotes for three City Hall Maintenance/ Up Keep projects

This memorandum is being submitted to the Finance Committee for the purposes of providing estimates for and requesting funds from the ARPA Grant in the amount of \$52,000. Asking for just over 10% above the three project lowest estimates, to over come the inflation and a plumber.

Project #1 Replacing carpeting in the main corridor/ hallway of city hall to a commercial adhesive carpet tile.

Project #2 Replacing and repairing the ceramic floor tile in both the men's and women's restroom on the second floor to a new ceramic floor tile and removing the floor drains in both restrooms.

Project #3 Repairing the brick work and replacing the concrete lintel over two identical windows in city hall that have failed to the point of water leaking in to the building and structural damaged to the point of pieces concrete may fall out to the sidewalk below.

Project #1 Scope:

Remove and dispose of old carpeting. Replace with new commercial adhesive carpet tiles in the main corridor/hallway of the first and second floor of city hall.
